6. Consider Reduced Scope and Value and Twelve-Month Term Extension by City of Diamond Bar, Contract #ML18031 (\$73,930 – Install EV Charging Station, Procure Two Light-Duty Zero Emission Vehicles and One Heavy-Duty Near-Zero Emission Vehicle)

The City requests to eliminate tasks and funding associated with the procurement of the heavy-duty near-zero emission vehicle. Additionally, the City requests a 12-month term extension due to delays associated with their charging station installation contractor and a misunderstanding regarding the sequence in which tasks could be completed.

7. Consider Substitute Recipient for \$1,660,000 Award to Nikola Energy, Inc. under the Hydrogen Infrastructure Partnership Program

In October 2021, the MSRC approved a \$1,660,000 award to Nikola Energy, Inc. (Nikola) to install a publicly accessible hydrogen fueling station in Ontario, California. The station was to be installed on the property of Nikola's partner, Travel Centers of America (TA). After the award, clarification has been obtained that the fueling infrastructure would be actually be owned by a special purpose entity established jointly by Nikola and TA: Nikola-TA HRS 1, LLC (a Delaware limited liability company). In order to enhance accountability in administration of the project, it is recommended that the MSRC substitute Nikola-TA HRS 1, LLC as recipient of the award, in that they are the entity which will actually own the infrastructure.

FYs 2021-24 WORK PROGRAM

8. Consider Clarifications to Proposed Major Event Center Transportation Program Announcement

At their March 2022 meeting, the MSRC-TAC recommended approval of the proposed Program Announcement for the Major Event Center Transportation Program as part of the MSRC's FYs 2021-24 Work Program. Subsequent to the MSRC-TAC meeting, but prior to consideration by the MSRC, a need was identified for greater specificity of the enforcement mechanisms associated with the required two years or seasons of operation following the MSRC-funded seasons. The MSRC-TAC Innovative Transportation Subcommittee has considered various options and recommends that funding recipients be obligated to pay back twenty-five percent (25%) of the funds previously reimbursed for each season of service not provided. Further details are provided in the attached staff report.

9. Consider Program Opportunity Notice for Transformative Transportation Strategies & Mobility Solutions

At their March 2022 meeting, the MSRC authorized the development of a \$3.0 million Program Opportunity Notice (PON) for innovative projects focusing on human transportation. The PON, with a submittal deadline of August 5, 2022, would seek submittals that offer to demonstrate new and innovative transportation strategies above and beyond traditional transportation demand strategies. In response to a submittal, the MSRC would retain the flexibility to request a detailed proposal, issue an RFP, or take no further action. The MSRC-TAC Innovative Transportation Subcommittee has reviewed the proposed PON and recommends approval. Ravenstein

FYs 2016-18 WORK PROGRAM Agenda Item #8 – Update on MSRC's Hydrogen Infrastructure Partnership Program

Ray Gorski, MSRC Technical Advisor updated the board members on the Hydrogen Partnership Program. The Hydrogen Program is the last element of the 2016-18 Work Program. It is the first and only time the MSRC has implemented an infrastructure related program this way. The primary intent was for the MSRC to partner with other agencies including the South Coast Air Quality Management District, the California Air Resources Board and the California Energy Commission (CEC) to help improve the financial viability of candidate hydrogen fueling

stations. The MSRC would have a pot of money readily available. This money could be used when one of the partnering agencies went through their regular infrastructure procurement process, and they found a project that was meritorious but needed a little bit of extra funding to make it financially viable. This Program Opportunity Notice (PON) was released in April 2018 and was intended as a two-year program. It had a \$3 million targeted funding amount and a \$500,000 per county geographic funding minimum. Though this program would have closed last April, there were compelling reasons for the MSRC to extend it for one year. To date, we had only received one proposal, but we knew there were procurements underway by agencies such as the CEC. Given the intent of the program, there needed to be time to allow the CEC to complete its activities. The program closed April 9, 2021.

The University of California Irvine submitted the first proposal with a \$1 million funding request. They had co-funding in the amount of \$800,000, with the CEC and South Coast AQMD each providing \$400,000. This proposal was awarded MSRC funding. California State University, Los Angeles (CSULA) and the San Bernardino County Transportation Authority (SBCTA) have submitted proposals this year. The MSRC took action to request full proposals from both CSULA and SBCTA relative to their initial concept responses. The MSRC-TAC Subcommittee is in receipt of the full proposals from CSULA and SBCTA which are currently under review. The intention is to have both proposals back for the MSRC-TAC for review and possible approval in the June timeframe.

The MSRC has an original targeted funding amount of \$3 million for this program. When adding up the total request from the three proposals that have either been awarded funding or have submitted full proposals, it exceeds the current targeted funding amount by \$662,000. The MSRC will need to decide as to whether or not they want to cap the program at \$3 million total funding level or if they want to dip into their current unallocated balance and fund above and beyond the original targeted funding amount.

Toward the end of the procurement process, we received three additional PON responses. These have undergone an initial evaluation by the MSRC-TAC Subcommittee, but we have not yet requested full proposals because there currently is not enough money within the Program to request full proposals. That is going to require additional MSRC consideration. The Air Products, Nikola and Clean Energy requests exceed the total amount of funding that the MSRC currently has allocated to this program category by \$13.468 million. This is a very significantly oversubscribed Work Program category. These projects would offer approximately \$31 million in project co-funding, for a total category value approaching \$50 million. The MSRC does not have \$13.468 million. There is also the \$2 million which remains allocated to the PON itself. Out of the FYs 2016-18 Work Program, there is the unused portion of the Event Center program that was originally targeted at \$6.5 million, approximately \$2.477 million of which will revert to the MSRC Discretionary Fund balance. When adding all that up, the total amount of money that the MSRC could choose to apply to the hydrogen refueling station projects is on the order of \$8.6 million, but it would still not fully fund the \$13.468 million causing an overage.

The MSRC-TAC Subcommittee will be reviewing these proposals and they may request the proposers to respond within a specific targeted funding range. The next steps are for the Subcommittee to complete review of the SBCTA and CSULA proposals which have been received. The intention is to have those recommendations available for the June MSRC-TAC

meeting. Secondly, the Subcommittee will continue their evaluation of the PON concept papers which were submitted. Those include the Air Products, Nikola and Clean Energy proposals. The initial review and the Subcommittee deliberations thus far suggest that those PON responses are meritorious. The recommendations that will be brought forth regarding this backup list will not be such that would exceed the total amount of funding that the MSRC has available. Therefore, the MSRC will not be asked to dip into their next year's Work Program. The MSRC will receive a similar update, but we think it's a good idea that we ask the board members directly what their desires are as to their unallocated funds, whether or not they would want the MSRC-TAC and its Subcommittee to continue the process of evaluating hydrogen projects which are over and above the targeted funding level, or if the MSRC would direct the MSRC-TAC not to utilize that additional funding and keep it available for the next year's Work Program. Most likely two proposals will be brought for final consideration in the June MSRC-TAC meeting, and then in August potentially September, we will bring forth recommendations to close out the balance of the hydrogen infrastructure program.

MSRC-TAC Member Dan York suggested we ask if the MSRC could consider at least allocating \$3 million, and then provide all the projects on the list \$1 million each. This would give good seed money to get those projects going. That would be six new or expanded stations with the balance to move into next year's program. SBCTA is short \$662,000, but maybe they are able to find that funding another way. Mr. York offered this as a suggestion to make this program grow, he stated that we need more hydrogen projects than what's being proposed and if we award six proposals as opposed to just three, then maybe that's incentive in next year's program to get more applicants knowing that some money is available.

MSRC-TAC Member Derek Winters stated that this program was oversubscribed and the MSRC has approved several non-zero projects. He would suggest moving forward to fund more zero emission projects as well.

MSRC-TAC Member Tim Olson stated that some of the individual stations are high-cost and it may come down to how many kilograms per day they are producing for each site, which is a factor in uptake and cost effectiveness. He also mentioned that the three projects below the current funding are all part of the supply chain. Mr. Olson asked who are the fleets which are going to benefit? Who are the actual site owners? Mr. Olson stated that based on the proposer's answers, that should factor in who gets funding, as opposed to Mr. York's proposal to award all proposals some funding. Mr. Olson asked if the proposers could document the fleets that they would be supporting with this project? Will they have the uptake, or will this be an asset that's not completely used? In some cases, these proposers may not have that information at this point, but Mr. Olson thinks it should be a factor in how we make that decision.

Ray Gorski, MSRC Technical Advisor, responded to Mr. Olson's comments by stating that these are project concept papers, though details vary between them. If the MSRC elects to request the full proposals, we would articulate to the project proponents that they provide the essential amount of detail and to make sure that they are able to stand by the original concept to a maximum. If there is some scaling involved, the number of vehicles would scale proportionately. Based upon the concepts provided, these projects were at least deemed to have merit and interest by the Subcommittee, which will be stated to the MSRC. It's the MSRC's determination as to whether they want to apply currently unallocated funding to this Work Program category.

Mr. Olson asked if there is a requirement to use renewable hydrogen under this program?

Mr. Gorski stated that there is not a requirement, however, it would be viewed as being a beneficial attribute of a project.

MSRC-TAC Member Minh Le stated that it may be difficult for the MSRC to make a recommendation based on Mr. Gorski's proposal to the MSRC-TAC to consider dipping into prior year balances or other unallocated funds without the full context of what else those funds could be applied towards. Mr. Le stated that though the MSRC-TAC is being presented an option right now as to how those funds could be used, it would be great to see the bigger picture for other projects. There may be more proposals for heavy duty freight electrification or something else. Mr. Le also stated that he liked Mr. York's recommendation but would suggest using the \$2 million from the FYs 2016-18 Hydrogen PON, which is kind of the same category and he would have no problem just using that prior balance.

Mr. Gorski answered Mr. Le by stating that the MSRC could apply their current unallocated funding to the Hydrogen Station PON or they could roll it forward to their next Work Program. Since we are the end of the FYs 2018-21 Work Program and because the MSRC only has the PON for hydrogen as the residual element of their 2016-18 Work Program, there is nothing else to apply that funding toward. The new Work Program will start July of this year. SCAG will be launching their Last Mile Goods Movement Program, probably within the next week or so. We will have to see what projects are received from that Work Program category. Given the timeline that's associated with that it would put us well into the next year's Work Program.

MSRC-TAC Member Steven Lee asked regarding the unused portion of the Major Event Center Transportation Program, \$2.5 million, if that does not get used up is there a possibility that we can open up a Major Event Center program again?

Mr. Gorski answered Mr. Lee by stating that that Work Program element has closed and those monies will revert to the unallocated balance. Because it is residual it is not earmarked at this time for anything. The MSRC at their discretion can utilize that funding for whatever Work Program type they choose to. It would be the decision of the MSRC as to whether or not they would want to continue with the Major Event Center category and apply funding to it. At this time, the process is that underutilized monies from a Work Program category revert to the overall Discretionary Fund and are available for use in any future program category that the MSRC chooses to initiate.

Mr. Lee asked how they could get the ball rolling in regards to reviving that program again?

Mr. Gorski stated that the MSRC will provide direction to the MSRC-TAC to initiate a process of developing the next Work Program. Typically, during non-COVID years, that is initiated with a type of workshop meeting, which is convened with members of the MSRC as well as the MSRC-TAC. Normally, these types of retreats or workshops would occur around the start of the new fiscal year for the MSRC, which starts on July 1st. It would be more difficult to do it via Zoom, but if members are unable to meet in a group in person due to restrictions, it may be our best option. At that point, the MSRC-TAC will get together and the MSRC will provide specific direction as to how to move forward with the development of the new Work Program.

FYs 2018-21 WORK PROGRAM

[MSRC-TAC Chair Jenny Chan arrived during the discussion of this item]

<u>Agenda Item #9 – Consider Application Received under Major Event Center</u> <u>Transportation Program Announcement</u>

MSRC-TAC Vice Chair Steven Lee explained this item is consideration of an application under the Major Event Center Transportation Program as an element of the FYs 2018-21 Work Program. The MSRC originally allocated \$6.5 million to the Major Event Center Transportation Program, with the goal of reducing a significant number of automobile trips and their associated air pollutant emissions by shifting attendees of major events out of their personal automobiles. It offers zero and near-zero emission transportation alternatives. The Program Announcement was released on April 5, 2019 with a closing date of March 30, 2021. To date the MSRC has awarded a total amount of \$3.8 million. One additional application which met the criteria for evaluation was received prior to the deadline and is being brought forward for consideration. Orange County Transportation Authority (OCTA) is requesting \$289,054 in MSRC funding assistance to implement special transit service to the 2022 OC Fair. The Major Events Subcommittee has reviewed OCTA's application and recommends approval of the \$289,054 award amount.

MSRC-TAC Member Derek Winters stated that though this item sounds great reducing the number of personal vehicles in and around the Fair area and he does support that, he is a little concerned about the high number of non-zero emission buses. He wonders if we could aim for 100% zero emission buses. At a minimum he'd like to see the current number flipped from eight zero and 27 near-zero emission buses.

Public Comment:

Louis Zhao from OCTA stated that in terms of buses in their fleet, they only have about eight zero emission buses that are functioning; they have a total of 10. There were some fueling issues that they had in providing service for the previous Fair. They only had one bus that was operating then, but they now have their fueling station up. In this case, they don't have the means to reverse the ratio to have more zero emission vehicles than CNG vehicles. Their core fleet right now is their CNG, so that's why they are presenting eight hydrogen vehicles. They want to make sure they do reserve some just in case something happens to one of those eight.

Mr. Winters asked if the hydrogen buses could be the ones getting used primarily in this situation?

Mr. Zhao answered Mr. Winters by stating that he will have to follow up with their operations fleet. Right now, the purpose is just using all of their vehicles at any given time. The big issue they have is to make sure that they balance the distances that their hydrogen vehicles can obtain

versus what their CNG can obtain. Their CNG vehicles cover the distances that the hydrogen vehicles cannot.

Mr. Le stated that the MSRC may always be providing subsidies or incentives for bus transportation to major events, but he would like to see a project for the transportation authorities to acquire zero emission buses. It may cost more upfront, but it may not cost as much in the long run.

OTHER BUSINESS

No other business was introduced.

PUBLIC COMMENTS:

Ian Stewart, President of Rail Propulsion Systems, stated that his company submitted a proposal to the Technology Group under Matt Miyasato, to do a technology demonstration. Mr. Stewart informed the MSRC-TAC that his company is offering a market ready product. They have developed the first battery electric locomotive to go into service in the US. It is currently in operation in Anaheim, California. It went into service June of last year. Mr. Stewart stated his company is proposing a three-hour megawatt version of their battery locomotive going into service in Southern California. They can have this ready for service this calendar year. They are a Southern California Company and have recently partnered with BYD to use their batteries on their locomotives, which means two California companies that have partnered to deliver zero emissions locomotives. Mr. Stewart also stated that he would like to address the gap between the demonstration funding and the market ready funding that the technology sector always deals with, and to address Carl Moyer funding in the past for rail applications, which it is not really set up to do right now.

MSRC-TAC Member Derek Winters stated that the zero-emission locomotive sounds great and asked if Mr. Stewart spoke with his CARB colleagues about his frustrations. If not, he would like to get Mr. Stewart's information, so his colleagues are aware of something potentially coming down the pipeline. Mr. Stewart said has been in discussions with Mike Jaczola from CARB.

MSRC-TAC Member Dan York thanked former chair AJ Marquez for his leadership in running the MSRC-TAC meetings this year. Mr. York stated that he is really excited about Jenny Chan and Steven Lee's commitment of service of leadership that they will be bringing to this board in the upcoming year. MSRC-TAC Vice-Chair Steven Lee thanked former AJ Marquez for his leadership and congratulated him on his retirement.

MSRC-TAC Member AJ Marquez thanked the board for their well wishes and wished them good luck with their future Work Programs.

Ray Gorski, MSRC Technical Advisor stated that the MSRC has a strong working relationship with the South Coast Air Quality Management District and its Technology Advancement Office. Dr. Aaron Katzenstein has replaced Mr. Naveen Berry, who recently retired from the South Coast AQMD. Dr. Katzenstein will be participating most likely in these meetings on behalf of the South Coast AQMD, because of the relationship the MSRC has with the District.

John Kampa, South Coast AQMD Financial Services Manager, explained the Health and Safety Code allows for the South Coast AQMD to be reimbursed for costs relating to the support of the MSRC program. These administrative costs are capped at 6.25% of the annual fee revenue that's collected within a fiscal year. For the proposal being presented, the administrative budget is at \$829,544 and this is against a projected cap of \$1,018,750. This leaves an unallocated balance of approximately \$189,000. <u>Agenda Item #10 – Consider Modified Scope of Work by City of Big Bear Lake, Contract</u> <u>#ML18088 (\$50,000 – Install Bicycle Trail)</u>

Cynthia Ravenstein, MSRC Contracts Administrator, explained that the City of Big Bear Lake was awarded \$50,000 as part of the MSRC's Local Government Partnership Program to install a segment of bicycle trail. The Rathbun Creek Trail was identified as 0.3-mile segment. It was described in the contract as approximately 1,500 linear feet of 10-foot-wide paved trail, as well as 120 linear feet of six-foot tall wood privacy fence with two gates and 850 linear feet of split rail fencing with two gates and a prefabricated bridge. The City has installed the trail and it is now in use, but they still need to complete the bicycle and pedestrian usage counts as required by their contract. Staff has noted that the completed trail is approximately 1,200 linear feet and doesn't have privacy fencing. The City explained that during construction, certain elements had to be adjusted to match the actual field conditions. They originally intended alignment for the trail was going to go through some private property. They still have a longer-term goal of doing that, but they currently weren't able to work things out with the property owner. The City was able to get an easement through some property of the County of San Bernardino, but that made it a shorter trail. Since the trail didn't go through private property, there was no need for privacy fencing, but they did install split rail fencing. They also installed a retaining wall and some concrete cross-gutters, which they hadn't expected to need. Since the City has made so many changes, they are asking the TAC if their changes could be deemed equivalent. If not, the City is

requesting a one-year extension to complete the other elements as described in the contract, otherwise the contract will expire this August.

Israel Gomez from the City of Big Bear Lake explained that the City had revised the scope of the project in the field. At the beginning a couple of property owners wanted privacy fences, but towards the end they said they didn't want them. The City instead installed wood rail fence on both sides of the trail for the whole alignment. Originally, they intended 700 linear feet of wood rail fence, but they ended up placing 2,400 feet of wood fence, additional cross-gutters and a retaining wall. The trail is now functional and being used by pedestrians and cyclists.

MSRC-TAC Member Minh Le asked the cost of the work they did. Even though it's modified from the original contract, what was the actual cost to the City? Was it more than \$50,000?

Mr. Gomez said he did not have the exact total with him, but that the project cost the City an estimated \$600,000.

Mr. Le stated that the project scope changed slightly, and the changes made by the City were in the spirit of the grant, he would move to approve the request.

MSRC-TAC Member Tim Olson asked if the City faced any local public opposition to what the City has completed or not completed? Did the City create a process for public input?

Mr. Gomez stated they performed the project outreach in 2017 when the master plan of the trail was approved and during the preparation of plans, there was no opposition. The public has actually been very supportive of the project.

ON MOTION BY MSRC-TAC MEMBER MINH LE AND SECONDED BY MSRC-TAC MEMBER TIM OLSON, THE MSRC-TAC VOTED TO RECOMMEND TO APPROVE FOR THE CITY OF BIG BEAR LAKE, CONTRACT #ML18088, A MODIFIED SCOPE OF WORK

Agenda Item #11 – Consider Modified Statement of Work and Two-Year Term Extension by City of South Gate, Contract #ML18146 (\$127,400 – Procure Five Light-Duty Zero Emission Vehicles and Install EV Charging Infrastructure)

Cynthia Ravenstein, MSRC Contracts Administrator, explained the City of South Gate had been awarded funding to purchase five light duty EVs and to install three Level II charging stations. In November 2020 the City had asked the MSRC to make one of those Level II charging stations a Level III charging station, and for a one-year term extension. The MSRC approved the modifications and granted an additional two years because Level III charging stations have a longer operational requirement associated with them under the MSRC Local Government Partnership Program. A contract modification document was prepared, but the City did not end up executing that document. The City decided they would do better with Level II charging stations after all. The City is now seeking to increase the number of Level II charging stations from three to six. These additional stations would be limited access. The City is not seeking

additional MSRC funding, but they are asking for a two-year term extension, which was previously approved.

MSRC-TAC Member Denis Bilodeau asked if the City had received additional funds when they were initially approved for the one Level III charger?

Ms. Ravenstein answered no that it is not possible, because under the MSRC program once you've been awarded funding under a program, the funds cannot be increased. Ms. Ravenstein added that she noticed some of the EV charging stations projects are finding that they have overestimated how much it was going to cost. It is unusual because more often in our projects, we find that people's costs increase, but in this particular category of project, we have a lot of cases where they're able to do more than what they originally thought.

MSRC-TAC Member Tim Olson asked what were the prime contributing factors for the City to go back to Level II and increase the number?

Ms. Ravenstein answered stating that the original rationale for going with the Level III was that they didn't expect to be doing any more installations after this particular round. They wanted to make sure that what they put in would be sufficient. We don't know exactly what came up in their thinking as to why they decided that Level II was going to be the best way to go, but maybe they just wanted to cover more locations.

Mr. Olson asked is the charging during the day or off-peak hours?

Ms. Ravenstein stated that the City didn't give that information.

South Coast AQMD Deputy Executive Officer Dr. Matt Miyasato shared some experience that they've had on their site. If it's for dedicated fleet vehicles, Level II makes more sense since it's less costly and you can have more of them. If it's for short term public charging, then DC fast charging makes more sense.

ON MOTION BY MSRC-TAC MEMBER DAN YORK AND SECONDED BY MSRC-TAC MEMBER STEVE HILLMAN, THE MSRC-TAC VOTED TO RECOMMEND TO APPROVE FOR THE CITY OF SOUTH GATE, CONTRACT #ML18146, A MODIFIED STATEMENT OF WORK AND TWO-YEAR TERM EXTENSION

ACTION: MSRC staff will include this contract modification on the next MSRC agenda for approval.

<u>Agenda Item #12 – Consider Incorporating a Labor Law Provision in MSRC Contracts for</u> <u>On-Road Truck Projects</u>

Principal Deputy District Counsel Daphne Hsu explained that in a recent South Coast AQMD Governing Board meeting there was an issue of incorporating a labor law provision into MSRC on-road truck contracts. The provision would require the contractor to notify South Coast AQMD in writing if it had been found by a court or an agency to have violated labor laws. They also would submit a yearly certification with this type of information and South Coast AQMD

would reserve the right to terminate a contract and request a return of funds, depending on the labor law violation.

MSRC-TAC Member Kelly Lynn asked for clarification in regards to companies which operate in various states and may be subject to different local and state labor laws.

Ms. Hsu answered the proposed language has been used previously in other South Coast AQMD contracts. It says court, federal or state agency is what they are required to report.

MSRC-TAC Member Tim Olson commented he thinks this provision is a good addition but wanted to add that the letter from Wayne Nastri also addressed another topic and that was the MSRC is interested in seeing better cost share information on projects. Having that kind of information enhances the decision-making for the MSRC to know what the matches are and where the rest of the capital is coming from.

Ray Gorski, MSRC Technical Advisor stated that when you assess a project, you really need to look at its overall ability to be successfully implemented and as we all understand being successfully implemented is usually a function of having the necessary financial resources. He thinks the comment that the Governing Board made during the discussion on this topic, that was articulated in the letter from Executive Officer Wayne Nastri to the MSRC, was how much visibility we share with the Governing Board when they're making their MSRC decision as to whether or not to allow a Work Program to go forward. That's really the discussion between Ms. Ravenstein, Contracts Administrator and Ms. Hsu, Principal Deputy District Counsel and everyone to determine what is the amount of information that needs to be in a Board report to the South Coast AQMD Governing Board members. We need to present a complete enough picture of the financial makeup of a project so they can make a good public policy call. He thinks that it's something that we will continue to work together and come up with a formula for presenting that information to the Governing Board so that in the future they have a comfort level that they are seeing the complete financial picture for a project.

MSRC-TAC Member Minh Le asked if the MSRC would be inserting the language around labor laws to awards moving forward and not onto existing projects?

Ms. Hsu answered stating this provision has not been executed yet. Also, part of the TAC's recommendation depends on how it would like to see this implemented.

Mr. Le stated that he has some concerns around the clawback of already spent funds; he thinks it sets a bad precedent. The award was given for a specific purpose and though the labor provision is important, he doesn't feel that it is necessarily directly related to the award. If a company were found to have violated some labor laws, he assumes that the courts would have imposed some kind of penalty on that organization. The company would have to pay back restitution or be under some kind of stipulated agreements. Wouldn't that mean that they are repaying back society or that law violation?

Ms. Hsu responded by stating that this provision is to protect the South Coast AQMD and its proprietary interests. We would be looking at violations that may increase our potential for liability. For example, if workers are driving hours beyond what they are supposed to, that will be the type of thing that we would be looking at. Ms. Hsu also stated that since this provision has

been in other contracts, we have not been aware of any adjudicated labor law violations, so there haven't been instances where we have actually terminated a contract or asked for funds back on other contracts.

Ms. Ravenstein added that when we notify someone that they've been awarded funds, in that time before we actually get the contract executed, we advise them that if they proceed with any of the work, they do so at their own risk. If they were to do something that was contrary to their contract it would be at their own risk.

Mr. Le stated that Ms. Ravenstein's statement wasn't his concern. He gave an example of a company given an award to buy some zero emission heavy duty trucks, then some other part of the South Coast AQMD were to find a labor violation unrelated to the work the MSRC is engaged with the zero emission trucks. He's not trying to defend a hypothetical labor law violation, but it's also unrelated to what the MSRC award would be for. It doesn't look good for the company nor the MSRC to be associated with a company that has a labor law violation, but that labor law regulation has nothing to do with the work that is at hand. That seems overly harsh, but he understands the optics and politics of it.

Ms. Hsu stated that since the provision has been used in other contracts, we haven't seen any findings or violations. We haven't terminated a contract based on something like that. This provision is not meant to penalize any contractor, it really is to protect the South Coast AQMD from liability. If something did happen, if there was an accident, if a driver was driving exceeding the allowed hours, those types of violations, that's what we're looking at. We are not looking at any and all violations, just very specific ones that might potentially increase our liability.

Mr. Gorski asked Ms. Hsu if there was a labor law violation found, who would have the final say to request the repayment provision?

Ms. Hsu stated that someone in the legal department would take a look and make a determination as to whether or not that might potentially affect the South Coast AQMD liability and proprietary interests. This issue has not come up in practice.

Dr. Miyasato recommended that the decision would typically rest with our General Counsel, but for this instance, because there are concerns from the TAC, we could put in the provision that if any such clawback provision was to occur, we would confer with the TAC or MSRC board.

MSRC-TAC Member Vicki White stated this process has been in place since 2018 for the South Coast AQMD incentive funding programs. Like Ms. Hsu had said, it is more about vetting the fleet owners before we move ahead with an award. We want to make sure they're in good standing. That being said, labor law violations are one of those situations that we know can happen among these fleet operators and that's something we have to be very concerned about and want to make sure we have a process in place that requires the applicants to disclose the information so that our legal counsel can look at it. They wouldn't be looking for one single violation that has penalties paid in full, they would be looking for a pattern. She doesn't want to speak on behalf of legal but that's her experience so far.

ON MOTION BY MSRC-TAC MEMBER VICKI WHITE AND SECONDED

BY MSRC-TAC MEMBER TIM OLSON, THE MSRC-TAC VOTED TO RECOMMEND TO APPROVE INCORPORATING A LABOR LAW PROVISION IN MSRC CONTRACTS FOR ON-ROAD TRUCK PROJECTS, WITH THE PROVISION OF CONFERING WITH THE MSRC BEFORE REQUESTING A RETURN OF FUNDS

ACTION: MSRC staff will include this contract language on the next MSRC agenda for approval.

FYs 2016-18 WORK PROGRAM Agenda Item #13 – Consider Project Concepts and Proposals Received under the Hydrogen Infrastructure Partnership Program (Marquez/White)

Hydrogen Infrastructure Subcommittee Chair AJ Marquez co-presented this item with MSRC-TAC Member Vicki White. Last month Ray Gorski, MSRC Technical Advisor, presented the 2016-18 Hydrogen Infrastructure Partnership Program at the May TAC meeting and also brought that forward to the MSRC meeting. The MSRC provided some guidance for the Subcommittee. They said to continue with the evaluations of the candidate proposals and concept papers. The MSRC was open to these projects even if they exceed the current targeted funding amount for the program of \$3 million. They expressed some enthusiasm for the shovel-ready projects presented.

For SBCTA's Arrow Maintenance Facility Hydrogen Fuel Upgrade Project, the hydrogen station will support operation of the zero-emission multiple unit (ZEMU) train operations. The Arrow Maintenance facility is currently under construction; it will open in July of 2021. The hydrogen refueling area construction begins in 2022. The ZEMU will begin a non-revenue demonstration service in the fall of 2023. Revenue passenger service will begin in 2024. This will be a two-year initial demonstration period and the ZEMU's operational life expectancy is 25 years.

MSRC-TAC Member Vicki White explained that the Subcommittee also evaluated a full proposal submitted by CSULA. This project involved an upgrade to the existing hydrogen station located on the CSULA campus. The project would be implemented in two phases. The first phase involves adding medium and high-pressure storage vessels and a new dual stage compressor to increase the existing station capacity. The second phase involves updating the cooling system and dispensing equipment to reduce the fueling time. The proposal submitted by CSULA was based on co-funding from the Department of Defense to complete the project, which was ultimately not awarded. In addition, the proposal identified Argon Laboratories as a partner using their new compression technology that would be funded by the Department of Energy. This partnership was subsequently removed from the project. CSULA is currently pursuing other funding sources and they have identified SoCal Gas as a potential partner, however there is no clear nexus between that funding and the project as it has been proposed. Since this project has experienced a substantial loss of project co-funding, the Subcommittee is not recommending an award for this project at this time.

The Subcommittee has also evaluated three project concepts that were submitted in response to the Program Opportunity Notice. The Subcommittee is recommending that full proposals be solicited from the three entities. The project concept submitted by Air Products, involves a new hydrogen station that would be located at the World Energy site in Paramount in Los Angeles

County. The new station would be connected to an Air Products hydrogen pipeline and serve as the world's first pipeline-supplied dual service hydrogen refueling station that would be capable of supporting all vehicle classes ranging from Class 8 trucks to light-duty passenger vehicles. The station would serve hydrogen fuel cell vehicles operated in the Gateway Cities region, including trucks traveling along the drayage corridor to and from the Port facilities. The MSRC also received a concept paper from Nikola Energy. Nikola is a truck original equipment manufacturer (OEM), however they also plan to develop hydrogen production and fueling infrastructure through their Nikola Energy Division. The project would involve a new hydrogen fueling station located in San Bernardino County. The project involves a partnership with Travel Centers of America, who own and operate full-service truck stops throughout the United States, including two of the largest truck stops in the South Coast Air District. The station would be available to all fueling customers, including those utilizing other OEM's fuel cell vehicles. The station would involve a liquid hydrogen storage system; the proposed station capacity would be 4,000 kilograms per day. The third project concept was submitted by Clean Energy. This project concept involves a new hydrogen filling station located in the City of San Bernardino at the corner of Central and Tippecanoe Avenues. The new hydrogen station would co-located with the Clean Energy renewable natural gas station. This project is intended to support a large-scale deployment of new fuel cell trucks associated with ecommerce operations in the area. The project will include liquid hydrogen sourced from a local plant in Ontario with renewable content of at least 33%; the station would be accessible to the public 24/7.

Mr. Marquez stated that the Infrastructure Subcommittee recommends the MSRC-TAC do the following: 1) recommend an award to the SBCTA in the amount of \$1.662 million. This recommendation is conditioned upon SBCTA's contractual agreement to reconfigure the hydrogen station as needed, and allow station access to other users at no cost to the MSRC, in the event that the ZEMU train is not in operation for at least five years; 2) Make no recommendation of award to Cal State LA at this time due to reasons cited earlier; and 3) Recommend that the MSRC authorize the submittal of full proposals from Air Products, Nikola Energy and Clean Energy with the guidance that any MSRC funding request be at a level previously or concurrently awarded by the MSRC.

MSRC-TAC Member Minh Le asked when was staff last in contact with Nikola regarding this project. Mr. Le asked about Nikola's commitment since their acquisition by General Motors and various scandals related to some allegations about their vehicles?

Ray Gorski, MSRC Technical Advisor, stated that Cynthia Ravenstein, MSRC Contracts Administrator, has been in contact with Nikola within the last couple of weeks. He added that oftentimes the Subcommittee does seek clarification of certain elements within the concept paper and staff wants to make sure that they are evaluating the correct information. We do have an ongoing dialogue with all project proponents.

Public Comment:

Omar Gonzalez, Nikola Manager of State and Local Government Affairs, spoke on behalf the company. Mr. Gonzalez thanked the MSRC for their support of hydrogen fueling infrastructure and its efforts to reduce emissions associated with the transportation sector. Nikola is both the manufacturer of battery electric and hydrogen fuel cell vehicles and is engaged in the development of hydrogen production and refueling stations to support the increasing presence of

all zero emission heavy duty fleets and passenger vehicles, leading to the creation of a comprehensive zero emission transportation ecosystem. Programs such as the Hydrogen Infrastructure Partnership enable Nikola's plans to build an expansive hydrogen production and fueling network in California and assist the state in achieving its goals for an innovative clean energy and transportation future. They're driven to revolutionize the economic and environmental impact of commerce as we know it and they request the MSRC's support to seek a full proposal from Nikola to construct a hydrogen fueling station intended to serve the needs of the heavy-duty truck sector operating in Inland Empire portion of San Bernardino County. Mr. Gonzalez thanked the staff and Subcommittee for reviewing their project concept and the committee for their consideration. Mr. Gonzalez stated that if there are members unfamiliar with Nikola or are referencing stories from a year ago, he would be happy to set up a meeting to discuss and give more information.

ON MOTION BY MSRC-TAC MEMBER MINH LE AND SECONDED BY MSRC-TAC MEMBER KELLY LYNN, THE MSRC-TAC VOTED TO RECOMMEND TO APPROVE THE SUBCOMMITTEE'S RECOMMENDATIONS FOR PROJECT CONCEPTS AND PROPOSALS UNDER THE HYDROGEN INFRASTRUCTURE PARTNERSHIP PROGRAM

ACTION: MSRC staff will include these project concepts and proposals on the next MSRC agenda for consideration.

PUBLIC COMMENTS:

MSRC-TAC Chair Jenny Chan thanked former Chair AJ Marquez for his service on the MSRC-TAC. He served from May 2007 to June 2021, for a total of 14 years. MSRC staff will be mailing him a certificate as a token of appreciation for all his time on the MSRC.

AJ Marquez thanked Ms. Chan for her kind words. He added that when he was nominated for the committee 14 years ago, he was a complete novice at the work of the MSRC-TAC. He is an accountant by schooling and by trade but added that being a part of the committee was a wonderful experience and he learned a whole lot. The collective knowledge of this committee is tremendous and with that knowledge he wishes the committee to have success in the future.

A summary of the Final Report is attached. The MSRC staff has reviewed the Final Report and recommends approval.

The College Pass Program for Fullerton College students was operated by OCTA. During the program implementation period, registered full-time and part-time students were offered free rides on OCTA fixed-route buses.

The OCTA Marketing Team implemented a comprehensive launch campaign to promote the College Pass Program. With goals of reaching the maximum number of students and positioning the College Pass Program/OC Bus as a convenient and easy way for travel to and from campus, promotions were launched that included a prominent bus wrap, bus shelter ads, posters, brochures, social media, email blasts, and on-campus kick-off events to generate awareness and interests in riding among students.

At the end of the first semester, the program attracted 2,441 total unique student riders, an 105% increase compared to the number of student users during the first week of the program. OCTA's Marketing staff periodically continued the marketing efforts through information updates both in print and digital formats to keep students informed and engaged.

To ensure that Fullerton College students boarded the buses at no charge, student identification cards were encoded to work with OCTA farebox systems. Students also had the option to access their pass on the OC Bus mobile application to ride the buses.

The Fullerton College Pass Program started on August 2019. During the period of May through November 2020, OCTA transitioned to rear-door boarding as a safety precaution due to the COVID-19. During this time, the fareboxes were not used and ridership attributed to each college could not be tracked. Ridership declined systemwide due to the pandemic. In turn, there was not enough ridership to draw down the whole MSRC funding allocation prior to the expiration of funding.

When compared with the ridership prior to the College Pass Program, the Fullerton College Program helped increase the average monthly OC Bus ridership by 13%, or 2,652 boardings between the inception of the program on August 20, 2019, and March 2020. At that time, California issued a stay-at-home order due to the pandemic that resulted in the rear-door boarding safety measure and the subsequent inability to collect ridership data.

By offering a low-cost transit pass to more college students, OCTA demonstrated the feasibility of increasing use of public transportation while decreasing dependence on automobiles. This program has been very well received by Fullerton College and its students and a plan to continue the program beyond the initial period is currently underway.

SYNOPSIS:	The City requests to eliminate tasks and funding associated with the procurement of the heavy-duty near-zero emission vehicle. The City experienced delays associated with their electric vehicle (EV) charging station installation contractor and a misunderstanding regarding the sequence in which tasks could be completed. Therefore, the City also requests a twelve-term extension as part of the FYs 2016-18 Local Government Partnership Program.
FINANCIAL IMPACT:	If the MSRC approves the City's request, \$15,000 would revert to the AB 2766 Discretionary Fund.
RECOMMENDATIONS:	At a minimum, the MSRC Contracts Administrator recommends a two-month term extension.

DISCUSSION:

Contractor:	City of Diamond Bar
Project Title:	Procure Two Light-Duty Zero Emission Vehicles, One Heavy-Duty Near- Zero Emission Vehicle, and Install EV Charging
MSRC Funding:	\$73,930
Contract Term:	September 7, 2018 to November 6, 2026
Current Request:	Reduced scope and value and twelve-month term extension
Previous Requests:	Twelve-month term extension

<u>Project Description:</u> The MSRC awarded the City \$73,930: \$15,000 to procure a heavy-duty near-zero emission vehicle; \$20,000 to procure two light-duty zero emission vehicles; and \$38,930 towards the installation of a publicly accessible EV charging station. The City has completed installation of the charging station and made it available for public use in December 2021; nothing has been paid to date on this contract.

<u>Previous Requests:</u> In August 2020, the City indicated that the COVID-19 pandemic had interfered with the ability of contractors to work. They requested a twelve-month term extension. This request was process administratively.

<u>Contract Request:</u> The City requests to eliminate the tasks and funding associated with the procurement of the heavy-duty near-zero emission vehicle. The \$15,000 will revert to the AB 2766 Discretionary Fund.

The City experienced significant delays associated with the contractor, Noodoe, selected to install the EV charging station. Ultimately, the City was able to resolve the issues with the contractor and the station was placed into public service in December 2021. Contract #ML18031 requires that the station remain operational for five years. Given the current termination date, a two-month extension would suffice to cover this requirement. While the City may need additional time to complete reporting and request reimbursement, these tasks can be completed while the station operational requirement is being fulfilled.

Lastly, the City indicates that the delays in the construction of the charging station impacted the procurement of the zero emission vehicles. This was due to a misunderstanding regarding the sequence in which tasks could be completed. The City interpreted the order that completion dates were listed for tasks in the Project Schedule to mean that they could not proceed with ordering the vehicles until they had completed the station. Contract #ML18031 requires that the light-duty vehicles be operated for three years. In order to include the light-duty vehicles in their upcoming budget and complete the procurement, the City requests a 12-month term extension.

The comparative completion dates in the contract for the vehicles and station were simply a reflection of the schedules which the City had included in their original application. Unless there is a clear statement to the contrary, completion deadlines in MSRC contracts do not preclude contractors from finishing tasks early. To the best of MSRC staff's knowledge, this is the first instance of this particular confusion occurring.

<u>Recommendations</u>: At a minimum, the MSRC Contracts Administrator recommends a twomonth term extension to allow the City to fulfill the operational requirement for the EV charging station.

Extension Request for MSRC Contract #MS18031

Mr. Mackenzie,

The City of Diamond Bar respectfully requests a time extension to the AB 2766 Discretionary Fund Contract No. MS1803 for an additional twelve (12) months. The contract was originally executed on September 7, 2018, for a period of eighty-six (86) months, including a three-year operational period. On July 20, 2021, the SCAQMD granted a modification of the terms due to Covid Impacts, the term of the existing contracts expires November 6, 2026.

The original description of the Project Elements outlined in the contract called for the installation of:

- One (1) Level II type EV charging station dedicated 24/7 for public use, located at City Hall.
- Procurement of two light-duty zero emissions vehicles.
- •Procurement of one heavy-duty near zero emission vehicle.

The City of Diamond Bar experienced delays with the construction of the EV charging station. The initial bids for construction were reviewed in January 2021, and on May 28, 2021, the City selected Noodoe as the lowest responsive bidder. An early setback was experienced when Noode initially attempted to resign from the work, however through several meetings with the company and to remain within the terms of the original budget allocated for the construction, the City successfully negotiated with Noodoe who proceeded with the construction work. Despite the delays with the selected Contractor, the EV Charging Station was operational and opened for public use on December 15, 2021.

The City request the additional time in order to complete the Charging Station progress report and submit reimbursements according to the grant terms. Since the EV charging was put into operation in December 2021, the public use has been steadily increasing, tripling in use as of March 2022. Without the contract extension, the City may lose the ability to request reimbursement funds, equal to \$38,930, set aside for this project.

The City of Diamond Bar experienced delays with the construction of the EV station that also impacted the procurement of the zero emission vehicles. The original Project Schedule laid out a sequence of Tasks, beginning with the EV installation and ensuring successful opening for public use. The next Task was to procure the light-duty vehicles and place them into service. This task was interpreted to be in sequential order with the increments of progress identified in the original project schedule as follows:

With limited staff available for this project, there have been significant milestones met including the completion of the planning and research to identify the two light-duty zero emission vehicles. The City has identified two (2) electric vehicles that would replace two (2) higher polluting vehicles, with both being used as staff pool vehicles and would receive high usage.

The requested extension would allow the City to continue with the procurement of the two (2) light-duty zero emissions vehicles as part of this grant. Without the extension, the City would lose the funding, equal to \$20,000 and would have to revise the funding for the planned vehicle replacements. The procurement obligations as part of this grant has been included in the City's Fiscal Year 2022/2023 proposed Operating Budget, scheduled for Adoption by the City Council in June 2022. In addition to the term extension, the City respectfully requests a downward adjustment to the Contract value in the amount of \$15,000, previously allocated for the purchase of a heavy-duty near zero emission vehicle.

SYNOPSIS:	In October 2021, the MSRC approved a \$1,660,000 award to Nikola Energy, Inc. (Nikola) to install a publicly accessible hydrogen fueling station in Ontario, California. The station was to be installed on the property of Nikola's partner, Travel Centers of America (TA). After the award, clarification has been obtained that the fueling infrastructure would be actually be owned by a special purpose entity established by Nikola and TA: Nikola-TA HRS 1, LLC (a Delaware limited liability company).
FINANCIAL IMPACT:	\$1,660,000 was previously awarded to Nikola. Nikola-TA HRS 1, LLC would substitute for Nikola; no new funds would be allocated.
RECOMMENDATIONS:	In order to enhance accountability in administration of the project, it is recommended that the MSRC substitute Nikola-TA HRS 1, LLC as recipient of the award, in that they are the entity which will actually own the infrastructure. No other aspects of the project would be changed.

SUBJECT:	Consider Clarifications to Proposed Major Event Center Transportation Program Announcement
SYNOPSIS:	At their March 2022 meeting, the MSRC-TAC recommended approval of the proposed Program Announcement for the Major Event Center Transportation Program as part of the MSRC's FYs 2021-24 Work Program. Subsequent to the MSRC-TAC meeting, but prior to consideration by the MSRC, a need was identified for greater specificity of the enforcement mechanisms associated with the required two years or seasons of operation following the MSRC-funded seasons.
FINANCIAL IMPACT:	Financial impacts will vary depending upon the number of seasons of service a funding recipient supplies following the MSRC-funded seasons, and whether service is provided for a portion of a season. In the most extreme case, should a funding recipient fail to provide service for any portion of either of the required two seasons of operation following the MSRC-funded seasons, they would be responsible to pay back 50% of the funds previously reimbursed. These funds would revert to the AB 2766 Discretionary Fund.
RECOMMENDATIONS:	The MSRC-TAC Innovative Transportation Subcommittee has considered various options and recommends that funding recipients be obligated to pay back twenty-five percent (25%) of the funds previously reimbursed for each year or season of service not provided. Further details are set forth below.

BACKGROUND

At their March 3, 2022 meeting, the MSRC-TAC considered a proposed draft Program Announcement (PA) for the Major Event Center Transportation Program. The PA would seek applications with the objective of transitioning the event center transportation provider to sustainable operations. The MSRC would fund a maximum of two event seasons, and the funding recipient would be obligated to continue providing event transportation service for a minimum of two event seasons beyond the MSRC funding period. The MSRC-TAC recommended approval of the proposed PA. Subsequent to the MSRC-TAC meeting, but prior to MSRC consideration of the proposed PA, a need was identified for greater specificity of the enforcement mechanisms associated with the required two years or seasons of operation following the MSRC-funded seasons. It was deemed prudent to seek direction from the MSRC-TAC and the MSRC-TAC Innovative Transportation Subcommittee before bringing the proposed PA forward to the MSRC for approval.

OPTIONS CONSIDERED

The Subcommittee considered three main points which were impacted by the required service beyond the MSRC-funded period:

- <u>When will the Final Report be due</u>? A portion of reimbursement will be withheld until submission and approval of the Final Report. This helps to ensure timely report submittal. In previous iterations of the Major Event Center Transportation Program, this has generally been 5% and the Final Report has been required at the end of the MSRC-supported service. In the current case, there were questions as to whether continuing that practice would be the most beneficial approach. Options considered were:
 - A. Continue to require the Final Report at the end of the MSRC-funded service. This would minimize the financial burden on the service provider, as they would be able to receive their retention fairly quickly.
 - B. Require the Final Report at the end of <u>all</u> required service. This would offer the MSRC the opportunity to learn how well the transition to self-supporting operation went. The retention would be held for two years, however, and could be substantial on larger awards.
 - C. Require both Interim and Final Reports. 5% will initially be withheld from all reimbursements. Of this amount, \$25,000 or 5% of the total amount reimbursed, whichever is less, will be retained pending submission and approval of a Final Report covering both the MSRC-funded and additional two seasons of operation. The difference, if any—primarily this would occur on larger awards—will be released following submission and approval of the Interim Report covering the MSRC-funded season(s) of operation.

The Subcommittee recommends Option C above – requiring both Interim and Final Reports. They felt this provided the best balance of the MSRC's informational needs with sensitivity to the financial burdens on the service provider.

- How much payback will be required if out-year service is not performed? The MSRC has signaled their intention that there should be real consequences in the event the two outyears of service are not provided. Thus, there will be payback required in this situation. Options considered were:
 - A. Payback 25% of previously reimbursed funds per year of service not provided. This figure is based on the simple calculation of four years total service requirement, assuming two years of MSRC-supported service (most likely scenario). If service is provided for a portion of a year, payback could be pro-rated.

- B. 16.6% (1/6) payback per year. This figure takes into consideration that emission benefits diminish each year due to the greening of the light duty fleet.
- C. Calculated based on specific projected benefits. Could be problematic to calculate, and actual benefits may differ.

The Subcommittee recommends Option A above – requiring payback of 25% per year for service not performed. It's straightforward how this figure is derived, and it provides unambiguous consequences.

3. <u>What if some out-year service is provided, but it differs significantly from the MSRC-funded</u> <u>service</u>? MSRC staff have received questions from prospective applicants expressing concerns that they might find it necessary, for reasons outside their control, to make modifications to the service provided in the out-years. Would there be no provision for flexibility?

The Subcommittee considered that the inclusion of a payback provision does not negate the MSRC's ability to consider modification requests. Firstly, if specific differences in service were anticipated at the time of application submittal, these could be approved upon award and included in the contract. Alternatively, if, following the completion of the MSRC-funded service, circumstances changed and the award recipient deemed a change in service necessary for the following season(s), the service provider would have the opportunity to avail themselves of the regular MSRC process to request approval of the change.

RECOMMENDATIONS

In summary, the MSRC-TAC Innovative Transportation Subcommittee recommends:

- Require both Interim and Final Reports. Five percent (5%) will initially be withheld from all reimbursements. Of this amount, \$25,000 or 5% of the total amount reimbursed, whichever is less, will be retained pending submission and approval of a Final Report covering both the MSRC-funded and additional two seasons of operation. The difference, if any, will be released following submission and approval of the Interim Report covering the MSRCfunded season(s) of operation.
- 2. Payback 25% of previously reimbursed funds per year of service not provided.
- 3. No need to modify PA to address partial performance in out years the regular MSRC contract modification request process applies.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

Financial impacts will vary depending upon the number of seasons of service a funding recipient supplies following the MSRC-funded seasons, and whether service is provided for a portion of a season. In the most extreme case, should a funding recipient fail to provide service for any portion of either of the required two seasons of operation following the MSRC-funded seasons, they would be responsible to pay back 50% of the funds previously reimbursed. These funds would revert to the AB 2766 Discretionary Fund.

SECTION 1 - INTRODUCTION

The Mobile Source Air Pollution Reduction Review Committee (MSRC) Major Event Center Transportation Program first debuted in 2010, and over the past twelve years the MSRC has co-funded numerous programs that provided convenient, low-cost transportation alternatives for accessing major sports and entertainment venues throughout the South Coast region. The purpose of this Program Announcement is to again offer event center transportation co-funding, but with an important caveat; the MSRC intends this offering to be the final funding under this Program.

A primary goal of Major Event Center Transportation Program remains the same: seek cost-effective opportunities to reduce a significant number of automobile trips and their associated air pollutant emissions by shifting attendees of major event center functions out of their personal automobile and onto zero and near-zero emission transportation alternatives. This final edition carries with it an additional but equally important objective – to successfully transition our long-time transportation partners to *ongoing, sustainable event center transportation*. This will ensure the MSRC's decade-long investment continues to pay dividends to the communities that bear the air pollution and traffic congestion burden, the oftentimes unrecognized byproducts of major entertainment venues.

The past decade has brought significant advancements in automotive technology. Low-emitting gasoline vehicles, hybrid electric vehicles, and a rapidly increasing number of zero-emission electric vehicles have resulted in an overall cleaner fleet of personal automobiles. As a result of this fleet modernization, the overall automobile fleet emissions in the South Coast region are about *77% lower* than when the Event Center Program began in 2010. To ensure this final Event Center program achieves cost-effective air quality benefits, a primary focus of this funding opportunity is to align major event centers with operators of the cleanest vehicles, giving priority to those entities who commit to a zero-emission transportation option for event attendees.

The MSRC has allocated a total of \$3.0M in **Clean Transportation Funding**[™] for this Program. As discussed in subsequent sections of this Program Announcement, proposals will be accepted beginning on <u>April 1May 6</u>, 2022, through <u>September 30October 28</u>, 2022. This funding opportunity has at its core the following goals and objectives:

- ⇒ Partner with Major Event Center venues and transportation providers who have previously implemented - and successfully demonstrated - event center transportation services, and assist those partners in transitioning to ongoing, sustainable event center transportation. This includes the identification of funding sources or revenue to support future transportation services beyond this MSRC funding opportunity;
- Seek out additional major event center venues located within the South Coast AQMD jurisdiction that experience high levels of traffic congestion during scheduled events and are not served by, or are insufficiently served by, regular public transit services;
- ⇒ Partner with transportation providers and event center venues to develop and implement new or expanded programs to attract patrons to transit services that are tailored to each venue's scheduled events;
- ⇒ Utilize the cleanest commercially available vehicles to implement event center transportation service, with a preference for zero-emission vehicles. At a minimum, event center transportation vehicles must be 90% lower emitting than the current heavy-duty emissions standards;

This final Event Center Transportation Program funding opportunity spans three fiscal years – FYs 2021/'22 through 2023/'24. As noted herein, applicants may propose transportation services for a maximum of two consecutive event seasons, with an obligation to perform transportation service for an additional two (2) consecutive event seasons.

While many of the features of the previous event center programs are retained in this funding opportunity, several major changes should be noted:

- All on-road transportation performing Event Center transportation services under this Program must be zero emission or near-zero emission. This means that the vehicle drive system must be certified by the California Air Resources Board (CARB) as a zero-emission vehicle or meet CARB's Optional Low-NOx Standard of 0.02 grams per brake horsepower hour (g/bhp-hr).
- Applicants are eligible to propose a maximum of two (2) consecutive event "seasons", wherein a "season" consists of multiple events or an event that spans multiple days.
- All events receiving MSRC Clean Transportation Funding[™] under this Program Announcement must be held no later than December 31, 2025.
- Event transportation for the mandatory two additional consecutive years or consecutive event seasons must be completed no later than December 31, 2027.

The following Sections describe the eligibility requirements to participate in the MSRC Major Event Center Transportation Services Program and guidelines for proposal preparation. It is important to recognize that the MSRC must ensure that the use of Clean Transportation funds will result in <u>direct</u>, tangible, and quantifiable air <u>quality benefits</u>. To this end, this Program Announcement stipulates specific performance thresholds and participation obligations that must be met in order to be deemed eligible for an MSRC funding award. Projects submitted for funding consideration will be scrutinized to ensure they meet the minimum eligibility requirements described herein.

MSRC staff members are available to answer questions and provide technical and programmatic guidance as appropriate. Please refer to Section 6 of this document for a list of MSRC Staff contacts.

Available Funding - The total amount of MSRC **Clean Transportation Funding**[™] allocated for the Major Event Center Transportation Program is \$3.0M. This funding level is a targeted amount – should meritorious projects be received totaling greater than \$3.0M, the MSRC reserves the right to increase the amount of total funding available.

Also, should the MSRC receive proposals with total requests less than the amount allocated, or if proposals are deemed non-meritorious, the MSRC reserves the right to reduce the total funding available and reallocate funds to other Work Program categories. The MSRC also reserves the right to not fund any of the proposals received, irrespective of the merits of the proposals submitted.

Please note that the source of MSRC **Clean Transportation Funding**[™] for projects submitted in response to this solicitation is motor vehicle registration fees collected by the California Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) in accordance with the California Health and Safety Code. Thus, the availability of MSRC **Clean Transportation Funding**[™] is contingent upon the timely receipt of funds from the DMV. Neither the MSRC nor South Coast AQMD can guarantee the collection or remittance of registration fees by the DMV.

SECTION 2 – ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

This Program Announcement seeks to facilitate the reduction of automobile trips and mitigate traffic congestion by shifting event attendees out of their personal automobiles and onto zero and near-zero emission transportation at major event centers that are not currently served by adequate, regularly scheduled transit or shuttle service prior to, during, and following the venue's events.

For the purpose of this Program Announcement, the following eligibility requirements apply:

- Major Event Center a Major Event Center is defined as a publicly or privately-owned, publicly
 accessible venue located within the geographical jurisdiction of the South Coast Air Quality Management
 District that possesses the following attributes, at a minimum:
 - Occupancy capacity of at least 7,500 people;
 - Average event attendance of at least 5,000 people;
 - Dedicated parking lot or structure co -located with the event center.
- Traffic Impacted Event A scheduled event held at a Major Event Center that results in recurrent traffic congestion prior to, during, or after the scheduled event whose impact on surrounding roadways, arterials, intersections, or freeways exceeds design capacity;
- Transportation Provider includes but is not necessarily limited to a) public transit agencies, including regional and municipal transit agencies and authorities; b) private transit operators, including subcontractor service providers to public transit agencies; and c) paratransit providers and other licensed, private transportation and shuttle providers;
- Qualifying Transportation Vehicles vehicles proposed for use in Event Center Transportation Services must conform to the following minimum requirements:

On-Road Bus and Shuttle Vehicles:

- All on-road vehicles performing Event Center transportation services under this Program must be certified by the California Air Resources Board as zero-emission vehicles or be equipped with an engine that is certified at CARB's Optional Low-NOx emission standard of 0.02 g/bhp-hr;
- Vehicle Seating Capacity vehicles must have a minimum seated position capacity of twentytwo (22) occupants;
- Vehicles must meet all Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), US Department of Transportation (DOT), California Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV), and other applicable regulatory agency.
- Transportation Deficient the Event Center must be Transportation Deficient. This is defined as an Event Center that is not served by regularly scheduled public transit or private shuttle service sufficient to entice patrons to attend the event using public transit rather than private automobile, or is served by public and/or private transportation services that are operating at maximum capacity. Please note that this Program Announcement is NOT intended to subsidize ongoing public or private transportation services.

The MSRC seeks the formation of *partnerships* between traffic-impacted, transportation-deficient major event centers and transportation providers who operate qualifying vehicles. The following Sections define who is eligible to submit a proposal to the MSRC, who is eligible to enter in to a contract for event center transportation services, and what transportation costs are eligible for reimbursement by the MSRC:

- Who can submit a proposal in response to this Program Announcement? Either a qualifying major event center, a qualifying transportation provider, or a County Transportation Commission may respond to this Program Announcement and submit a proposal for MSRC consideration. Proposals may also be submitted from a joint County Transportation Commission/event center/transportation provider partnership. Please note that the following conditions apply:
 - A proposal submitted by qualifying Major Event Centers must identify what Transportation Provider(s) will provide the event center service. The proposal must include a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) or letter of support between the event center and transportation provider(s) stating their mutual intent to implement and operate event center transit service in accordance with Program requirements in the event the MSRC provides a funding award;
 - A proposal submitted by a qualifying Transportation Provider must identify which Major Event Center(s) will be served in the Program. The proposal must include an MOU or letter of support between the transportation provider and event center(s) stating their mutual intent to implement and operate event center transit service in accordance with Program requirements in the event the MSRC provides a funding award;
 - A proposal submitted by a County Transportation Commission must identify which Major Event Center(s) will be served in the Program and identify what Transportation Provider(s) will provide the event center service. The proposal must include an MOU or letter of support between the County Transportation Commission and transportation provider and/or event center(s) stating their mutual intent to implement and operate event center transit service in accordance with Program requirements in the event the MSRC provides a funding award;
 - A proposal submitted jointly by a County Transportation Commission in partnership with an event center and transportation provider(s) must also include an MOU or letter of support, as above.
- Who is eligible to receive an award of MSRC Clean Transportation Funding[™] under this Program Announcement? While either a County Transportation Commission, major event center or qualifying transportation provider are eligible to submit a proposal, only the qualifying transportation provider or County Transportation Commission is eligible to enter into a contract on behalf of the proposed event center transportation service partnership. The rationale for this restriction is that only transportation service costs (including transit program and traffic control costs) are eligible for reimbursement under this Program. Thus, it makes sense that the service provider who incurs direct expenses in providing transportation services be the party to the contract that provides reimbursement. Please note that the MSRC does not enter into three-party agreements.

In summary, major event centers that meet the above eligibility requirements and transportation providers that meet qualifying requirements are eligible to participate in this MSRC Program. Both Event Centers and Transportation Providers are eligible to submit a proposal; however, each party must be identified by name in the proposal, accompanied by a MOU between the named participants. Only the transportation provider can be the MSRC funding recipient and contract signatory.

SECTION 3 - PARTICIPATION GUIDELINES, CONDITIONS, & RESTRICTIONS

The following guidelines, requirements, and conditions have been established and apply to all Proposals:

- 1. Program Scope The primary objective of this Program is to eliminate automobile trips, reduce automobile vehicle miles traveled (VMT), and reduce traffic congestion in the vicinity of a major event center prior to, during, and following an event, resulting in a reduction in air pollutant emissions. Automobile trip reduction and traffic congestion mitigation are achieved by shifting the travel mode of event attendees from their personal automobile and onto new or expanded zero or near-zero emission transportation service or dedicated zero/near-zero emission shuttle event center feeder service. MSRC Clean Transportation Funding™ is available to co-fund the cost of implementing new or expanded transportation programs. Only direct costs of transportation programs are eligible for reimbursement under this Program. Proposals submitted in response to this Program Announcement must include as named participants the major event center where new or expanded transit or shuttle service will be operated, as well as the transportation provider who will implement the event center transportation program.
- 2. Geographical Funding Minimum The MSRC has established a Geographical Funding Minimum for each county within the SCAQMD. The geographical funding minimum amount has been set at \$250,000 per county. This funding set-aside guarantees a minimum level of funding for each county to implement Event Center Transportation projects. At the end of the application submittal period, September 30October 28, 2022, if any county has funds remaining in its geographical minimum, these funds will be made available to qualifying projects from any other county in order of receipt.
- 3. All events <u>receiving MSRC Clean Transportation Funding</u>[™] under this Program Announcement must be held prior to December 31, 2025.
- 4. Applicants are eligible to propose a maximum of two (2) consecutive event "seasons", wherein a "season" consists of multiple events or an event that spans multiple days. There is an obligation to perform event transportation services for an additional two consecutive event seasons at the completion of the MSRC-funded season(s). Note that the requirement to perform transportation service for two additional event seasons is irrespective of whether MSRC funding is requested for one or two event seasons under this Program Announcement.
- 5. In all cases, acceptance of an MSRC funding award and execution of a binding agreement obligates the funding recipient to implement two (2) additional consecutive event seasons at recipients' expense, with transportation services fully implemented no later than December 31, 2027. <u>Should the recipient not provide one or more of these additional seasons of service, they will be obligated to pay back twenty-five percent (25%) of the funds previously reimbursed for each season of service not provided. If service is provided for a portion of a season, payback could be pro-rated.</u>

- 6. Eligible Uses of MSRC Funds MSRC funds may be used to offset direct operating costs associated with event center transportation programs. These include transportation operations and traffic control costs as defined below:
 - Transportation Operations Direct costs associated with operations of event center transportation vehicle and/or rail operations subject to the requirements and conditions outlined in Section 2, Eligibility Requirements;
 - Event Center Traffic Control/Bus Priority Costs associated with providing traffic control to provide participating transportation vehicles event center ingress and egress priority may also be proposed as project co-funding. This includes, but is not necessarily limited to: special lane designation for transit vehicles, including cones, lane striping, etc.; traffic control personnel to direct traffic and grant participating vehicles faster entry and exit; designation of areas for drop off and pickup of event center patrons who utilize the transportation service, including directional signage, markings and placards, etc.
- 7. Transportation Programs Advertising, Outreach, Marketing, and Promotion All event center transportation programs projects that receive an MSRC Clean Transportation Funding[™] award must include advertising and promotion of the availability of the service as a project element. This is a mandatory component of any MSRC-funded event center transportation programs project. Advertising and promotion may include, but is not limited to:
 - a) Radio, television, newspaper, or specialty publication advertisements;
 - b) Print materials;
 - c) Materials developed for incorporation into a website, electronic media, etc.;
 - d) Transportation program kickoff events, ribbon cuttings, or news conferences, etc.
- 8. **Program Co-Funding Requirements** Major event center projects funded by the MSRC are required to provide minimum project co-funding. Co-funding must be greater than or equal to 60% of the total project cost, i.e., a maximum of 40% of total project costs to be co-funded by the MSRC.

Eligible project co-funding includes the following:

- Direct Cost Share Cash, direct labor, and equipment use contributions from the transportation provider may be accounted for as co-funding;
- Fare box Revenue Fare box revenue collected to augment MSRC-funded transportation program may be documented and applied as co-funding;
- Transportation Programs Outreach, Marketing, and Promotion Direct costs associated with advertising the availability of event center transportation programs may be applied as co-funding. Appropriate outreach may include, but is not limited to, radio, television, newspaper, or specialty publication advertisements, printed materials, materials developed for incorporation into a website, electronic media, transportation program kickoff events, ribbon cuttings, or news conferences, etc.

- Event Center Traffic Control/Bus Priority Direct costs associated with providing traffic control to provide participating transportation vehicles event center ingress and egress priority may also be proposed as project co-funding.
- Funding Restrictions MSRC funds may only be applied to direct operating costs associated with event center transportation programs. These include transportation operations and traffic control costs only. MSRC funds cannot be used:
 - To fund capital acquisition costs associated with transportation vehicle purchase;
 - To recoup lost parking lot revenue.
- 10. MSRC Funds Remitted on a Reimbursement Basis MSRC funds will be distributed on a reimbursement basis only upon completion of approved project milestones and submission of all required reports and invoices. Both an Interim and a Final Report will be required. Note that five percent (5%) will initially be withheld from all reimbursements. Of this amount, \$25,000 or 5% of the total amount reimbursed, whichever is less, will be retained pending submission and approval of a Final Report covering both the MSRC-funded and additional two seasons of operation. The difference, if any, will be released following submission and approval of the Interim Report covering the MSRC-funded season(s) of operation.

11. Additional Conditions on MSRC Funding

- MSRC projects are funded on a "site-specific" basis; that is, each project is evaluated with respect to the proposed event center's unique location, traffic congestion, availability of other transportation options, etc. Thus, proposals that result in an award of MSRC funds are <u>not allowed</u> to change the event center venue under any circumstances. In the event the proposed venue becomes unavailable, nonviable, or no longer cost-effective, either contract negotiations will terminate or the contract will terminate, as applicable;
- All projects must include an advertising, marketing, and outreach component. Acceptable outreach strategies are described in the previous section;
- Conflict of Interest Proposers must identify possible conflicts of interest with other clients affected by actions performed by the firm on behalf of the MSRC. Although the bidder will not be automatically disqualified by reason of work performed for such firms, the MSRC reserves the right to consider the nature and extent of such work in evaluating the proposal;
- Certifications All Proposers must complete and submit the included Attachment G forms as an element
 of their Proposal (unless specifically exempted below):
 - Internal Revenue Service Form W-9 Request for Taxpayer Identification Number and Certification, and Franchise Tax Board Form 590 Withholding Exemption Certificate. If you are selected for an award, you cannot be established as a vendor without this information.
 - Campaign Contributions Disclosure. This information must be provided at the time of application in accordance with California law. You may be asked for an update when awards are considered.
 - Certification Regarding Debarment, Suspension and Other Responsibility Matters The SCAQMD needs this information for their vendor database.

- Disadvantaged Business Certification. The SCAQMD needs this information for their vendor database. <u>It will not be considered in the determination of your MSRC funding award</u>. Governmental entities do not need to complete this form.
- Finally, in accordance with state law, all projects awarded MSRC Clean Transportation Funding[™] are subject to audit. The provisions of the audit are discussed in the Sample Contact, included as Section 9 of this Program Announcement. It is highly recommended that bidders employ government accepted accounting practices when administering their MSRC co-funded project.

SECTION 4 – PROGRAM ANNOUNCEMENT TIMETABLE

The MSRC understands that developing an event center transportation programs project is a complex undertaking. The MSRC also appreciates that events scheduled at a major venue are firm; thus, the MSRC Program is designed to afford potential proposers as much flexibility as possible to allow development of outstanding event center transportation projects.

Electronic Application Submittal Process To reduce the need to photocopy, package, and physically submit paper applications, the Major Event Center Transportation Program requires that applications be submitted electronically in PDF format using the MSRC Website. SECTION 7 - PROPOSAL EVALUATION AND APPROVAL PROCESS

MSRC staff members will screen proposals upon receipt to ensure compliance with all mandatory Program Announcement requirements. In the event a proposal is deemed noncompliant, MSRC Staff will notify the

proposer of the issues and corrective actions required. Note that a noncompliant proposal is not considered "received" and will not undergo further evaluation until all proposal deficiencies are remedied.

Proposals deemed compliant will be forwarded to an Evaluation Subcommittee comprised of members of the MSRC Technical Advisory Committee (MSRC-TAC). Proposals will be evaluated in order of receipt using criteria established by the MSRC; these criteria are listed below. Proposals will be recommended for funding based upon their conformance with the established criteria. It is possible that all funding allocated to this Program could be fully expended prior to the close of the proposal submittal period, <u>September 30October 28</u>, 2022.

Evaluation Criteria – Proposals will be evaluated using a two-step process. The first step (Step 1) consists of a technical analysis to ensure that the project has a high probability of achieving a net air quality benefit. Only proposals that are determined to result in a net reduction in mobile source air pollution will undergo further evaluation (Step 2). MSRC Staff may request additional information from the project applicant to assist in this determination.

Step 2 continues the assessment of the merits of a proposed Event Center project. The specific criteria to be evaluated are outlined below. Each project will be assessed individually against the evaluation criteria. A maximum of 100 points is available – only projects that receive greater than 70 points will be considered for an MSRC funding award. Projects scoring less than 70 points will not be eligible for an MSRC funding award.

EVALUATION STEP 1:

<u>POTENTIAL TO ACHIEVE QUANTIFIABLE AIR POLLUTANT REDUCTIONS</u> - Each project will be analyzed to estimate its potential to achieve motor vehicle air pollution reductions, emphasizing reductions in oxides of nitrogen and particulate matter pollution. Factors to be evaluated include, but are not limited to:

- The types, quantity, emissions profile, and proposed utilization of the vehicles proposed to implement the event center transportation services;
- Event center transportation service ridership estimates based on previous documented event center project results, surveys or focus groups conducted to estimate potential transportation service utilization, etc.;
- The event center location, population density, and location relative to major arterial roadways and freeways;
- Availability of existing transportation options other than personal automobile;
- The number of events scheduled or planned for the event center during the proposed period of program; and
- The average venue attendance.

EVALUATION STEP 2:

- 1. SUCCESSFUL PARTICIPATION IN PAST EVENT CENTER TRANSPORTATION PROGRAMS (0 15 Points).
- 2. <u>PROGRAM CONTINUATION PLAN (0 50 Points)</u>. As discussed, MSRC funding is not intended to serve as an ongoing funding source for event venues. Event Center project applicants are required

to develop a plan to demonstrate how the proposed service will continue beyond the MSRC funding period, including the sources of internal and external revenue that will be pursued to augment and ultimately replace MSRC funding. Projects that have a definitive plan for continuing transportation programs well beyond the MSRC funding period will be awarded a higher point allocation.

3. <u>EVENT CENTER PROJECT COST-EFFECTIVENESS (0 – 20 Points</u>). Cost-effectiveness is a measure of a proposed project's potential for reducing mobile source air pollution relative to the MSRC funding amount sought. This is typically presented in units of "dollars per pound of air pollution reduced". The results of Step 1 will be evaluated in the context of the MSRC funding request. Points will be awarded in accordance with the following cost-effectiveness (CE) matrix:

CE (\$/Lb.)	POINTS
< \$500/Lb.	25
\$500 - \$1,499/Lb.	20
\$1,500 - \$2,499/Lb.	15
\$2,500 - 3,499/Lb.	10
\$3,500 - \$4,499/Lb.	5

- 4. <u>ZERO-EMISSION TRANSPORTATION BONUS (0 or 5 points)</u>. Applicants who utilize zero-emission vehicles to perform event center transportation are eligible to receive additional points. Applicants who commit to use zero-emission vehicles to perform a minimum of 25% of event center service trips will receive five (5) additional points. This commitment will be included in any subsequent MSRC funding agreement with the applicant.
- 5. <u>NEXUS TO OTHER PUBLIC TRANSIT SERVICES (0 10 Points</u>). MSRC experience over the past nine years has shown that vent Center projects that are ultimately most successful have a high degree of connectivity with other existing public transit services. This criterion evaluates the probability of successfully integrating the proposed transportation program with other existing public transportation services, including connectivity with <u>existing</u> regional or municipal bus service, Metrolink, light rail, transit centers, etc. Proposers should clearly outline the proposed Event Center transportation connectivity with other existing public transit services in their proposal.

Proposals deemed meritorious by the MSRC-TAC will be forwarded to the MSRC for evaluation, review, and potential funding approval. Please note that the MSRC retains full discretion and authority as it pertains to a potential award of **Clean Transportation Funding**[™]. The decision to award funding, or not award funding, will be based on the proposed project's potential to achieve direct and tangible emission reductions. Thus, it is anticipated that not all projects submitted for funding consideration will receive an MSRC award.

- performs 90 percent of the work within South Coast AQMD's jurisdiction.

Minority-Owned Business Enterprise means a business that meets all of the following criteria:

- is at least 51 percent owned by one or more minority persons or in the case of any business whose stock is publicly held, at least 51 percent of the stock is owned by one or more minority persons.
- is a business whose management and daily business operations are controlled or owned by one or more minority person.
- is a business which is a sole proprietorship, corporation, partnership, joint venture, an association, or a cooperative with its primary headquarters office located in the United States, which is not a branch or subsidiary of a foreign corporation, foreign firm, or other foreign business.

"Minority" person means a Black American, Hispanic American, Native American (including American Indian, Eskimo, Aleut, and Native Hawaiian), Asian-Indian American (including a person whose origins are from India, Pakistan, or Bangladesh), Asian-Pacific American (including a person whose origins are from Japan, China, the Philippines, Vietnam, Korea, Samoa, Guam, the United States Trust Territories of the Pacific, Northern Marianas, Laos, Cambodia, or Taiwan).

Small Business Enterprise means a business that meets the following criteria:

- a. 1) an independently owned and operated business; 2) not dominant in its field of operation; 3) together with affiliates is either:
 - A service, construction, or non-manufacturer with 100 or fewer employees, and average annual gross receipts of ten million dollars (\$10,000,000) or less over the previous three years, or

- * is at least 51 percent owned by one or more women or in the case of any business whose stock is publicly held, at least 51 percent of the stock is owned by one or more women.
- * is a business whose management and daily business operations are controlled or owned by one or more women.
- * is a business which is a sole proprietorship, corporation, partnership, or a joint venture, with its primary headquarters office located in the United States, which is not a branch or subsidiary of a foreign corporation, foreign firm, or other foreign business.

Further, in certain cases where a Form W-9 has not been received, the rules under section 1446 require a partnership to presume that a partner is a foreign person, and pay the section 1446 withholding tax. Therefore, if you are a U.S. person that is a partner in a partnership conducting a trade or business in the United States, provide Form W-9 to the partnership to establish your U.S. status and avoid section 1446 withholding on your share of partnership income.

Foreign person. If you are a foreign person or the U.S. branch of a foreign bank that has elected to be treated as a U.S. person, do not use Form W-9. Instead, use the appropriate Form W-8 or Form 8233 (see Pub. 515, Withholding of Tax on Nonresident Aliens and Foreign Entities).

Nonresident alien who becomes a resident alien. Generally, only a nonresident alien individual may use the terms of a tax treaty to reduce or eliminate U.S. tax on certain types of income. However, most tax treaties contain a provision known as a "saving clause." Exceptions specified in the saving clause may permit an exemption from tax to continue for certain types of income even after the payee has otherwise become a U.S. resident alien for tax purposes.

2. The treaty article addressing the income.

The article number (or location) in the tax treaty that contains the saving clause and its exceptions.

4. The type and amount of income that qualifies for the exemption from tax.

Sufficient facts to justify the exemption from tax under the terms of the treaty article. Page 2

Example. Article 20 of the U.S.-China income tax treaty allows an exemption from tax for scholarship income received by a Chinese student temporarily present in the United States. Under U.S. law, this student will become a resident allen for tax purposes if his or her stay in the United States exceeds 5 calendar years. However, paragraph 2 of the first Protocol to the U.S.-China treaty (dated April 30, 1984) allows the provisions of Article 20 to continue to apply even after the Chinese student becomes a resident allen of the United States. A Chinese student who qualifies for this exception (under paragraph 2 of the first protocol) and is relying on this exception to claim an exemption from tax on his or her scholarship or fellowship income would attach to Form W-9 a statement that includes the information described above to support that exemption.

If you are a nonresident alien or a foreign entity, give the requester the appropriate completed Form W-8 or Form 8233.

Backup Withholding

What is backup withholding? Persons making certain payments to you must under certain conditions withhold and pay to the IRS 24% of such payments. This is called "backup withholding." Payments that may be subject to backup withholding include interest, tax-exempt interest, dividends, broker and barter exchange transactions, rents, royaities, nonemployee pay, payments made in settlement of payment card and third party network transactions, and certain payments from fishing boat operators. Real estate transactions are not subject to backup withholding.

You will not be subject to backup withholding on payments you receive if you give the requester your correct TIN, make the proper certifications, and report all your taxable interest and dividends on your tax return.

Payments you receive will be subject to backup withholding if:

1. You do not furnish your TIN to the requester,

You do not certify your TIN when required (see the instructions for Part II for details).

3. The IRS tells the requester that you furnished an incorrect TIN.

 The IRS tells you that you are subject to backup withholding because you did not report all your interest and dividends on your tax return (for reportable interest and dividends only), or

 You do not certify to the requester that you are not subject to backup withholding under 4 above (for reportable interest and dividend accounts opened after 1983 only).

Certain payees and payments are exempt from backup withholding. See Exempt payee code, later, and the separate instructions for the Requester of Form W-9 for more information.

Also see Special rules for partnerships, earlier.

What is FATCA Reporting?

The Foreign Account Tax Compliance Act (FATCA) requires a participating foreign financial institution to report all United States account holders that are specified United States persons. Certain payees are exempt from FATCA reporting. See Exemption from FATCA reporting code, later, and the Instructions for the Requester of Form W-9 for more information.

Updating Your Information

You must provide updated information to any person to whom you claimed to be an exempt payee if you are no longer an exempt payee and anticipate receiving reportable payments in the future from this person. For example, you may need to provide updated information if you are a C corporation that elects to be an S corporation, or if you no longer are tax exempt. In addition, you must furnish a new Form W-9 if the name or TIN changes for the account; for example, if the grantor of a grantor trust dies.

Penalties

Failure to furnish TIN. If you fail to furnish your correct TIN to a requester, you are subject to a penalty of \$50 for each such failure unless your failure is due to reasonable cause and not to willful neglect.

Civil penalty for false information with respect to withholding. If you make a false statement with no reasonable basis that results in no backup withholding, you are subject to a \$500 penalty.

Criminal penalty for faisifying information. Wilifully faisifying certifications or affirmations may subject you to criminal penalties including fines and/or imprisonment.

Misuse of TINS. If the requester discloses or uses TINS in violation of federal law, the requester may be subject to civil and criminal penalties.

SECTION 1: INTRODUCTION

For over 30 years, the Mobile Source Air Pollution Reduction Review Committee (MSRC) has sought to develop and demonstrate cutting-edge transportation demand management (TDM) and "smart mobility" programs that expand the boundaries of how we *alternatively* commute – striving for faster, cheaper, and *greener* transportation solutions. As an investor in clean mobility, collaboration with expert project partners is essential to achieve the MSRC's goal of improving air quality by reducing motor vehicle pollution in the South Coast AQMD region.

This Program Opportunity Announcement (PON) is another Call to Action – to seek out innovative, and importantly, transformative transportation and mobility concepts that not only are effective in reducing air pollution and congestion, *but have staying power*.

This PON has ambitious goals, as it seeks concepts that are not only innovative, but have the potential to result in a transformative outcome – a paradigm shift in "the way it's done". For this to happen, the concept must be capable of being replicated on a broader scale throughout the South Coast region.

The following Sections amplify these goals and set forth the requirements and guidelines for submitting a response to this PON. MSRC staff is available to answer any questions – staff contacts for administrative and technical inquiries are included in Section 3 of this PON.

SECTION 2: PROGRAM OPPORTUNITY NOTICE OVERVIEW

This PON seeks the submittal of conceptual projects that offer to demonstrate new and innovative transportation strategies above and beyond traditional transportation demand strategies. This PON is broad in scope, but has a clear focus on "people movement" as opposed to Goods Movement. As such, all project concepts must have a nexus to the transport of those who live, work, and play in the South Coast AQMD region.

Key objectives under this PON are as follows:

- MSRC funding acts as **Seed Money** an initial investment to launch the innovative transportation strategy or program;
- A key objective is to achieve a **Transformative** Outcome a permanent and sustainable change in human mobility;
- The innovative transportation strategy or concept is **Replicable** within the South Coast region, and;
- The process and results of the development and deployment of the transformative mobility strategy is well **Documented** to serve as a roadmap to others who wish to replicate the concept.

The total available funding under this PON is **\$3.0 million**. It is anticipated this PON will result in multiple MSRC funding awards.

The MSRC strives to achieve broad geographic participation across the South Coast region. To this end, the MSRC is establishing a geographic funding target of at least \$250,000 per county. This geographic funding minimum, however, is conditioned on the receipt of meritorious project concepts that achieve the MSRC's program objectives as outlined in this PON. The MSRC is not obligated to fund any projects in any county that, in the sole opinion of the MSRC, do not meet program objectives.

SECTION 3: HOW TO PARTICIPATE

The Transformative Transportation Strategies PON is flexible in that the MSRC will accept responses ranging from a concept paper to a full proposal. Emphasis should be placed describing how the proposed mobility solution achieves the MSRC goals of a transformative outcome that is replicable within the South Coast region. Additionally, Section 4 of this PON lists additional criteria the MSRC will use to evaluate candidate concepts; and these can be used as further guidance when developing a response under this PON.

There are no restrictions as to who can submit a response under this PON; however, only entities deemed legal businesses, proprietorships, or agencies are eligible to receive a funding award.

The MSRC requests that responses submitted under this PON conform to the following guidelines:

- 1. Include the name of the individual or organization submitting under this PON, including but not limited to the e-mail address of the contact person(s) for technical and contractual matters;
- 2. A concisely but thoroughly written description of the innovative transportation strategy or concept proposed. This should include, but is not limited to:
 - A discussion of how the concept will result in a transformative and sustainable improvement in mobility and achieve long-term air pollution reduction benefits beyond the MSRC funding period;
 - The development status of the proposed transportation concept, i.e., at the conceptual stage requiring MSRC assistance to further refine the strategy prior to launch, or at the "shovel ready" stage in need of MSRC assistance to fund capital or operations. All stages of project development will be considered by the MSRC;
 - Identification of key project participants and stakeholders, and the status of forming essential partnerships;
 - The amount of funding requested from the MSRC, including the estimated total project cost, sources of match funding and other direct cost-sharing, and whether co-funding is secured or anticipated;

• A project schedule, including the timeframe for project implementation. Note that the MSRC does not have a specific timeframe or deadline for implementing innovative transportation demonstrations, but wants to understand project timing for planning purposes.

By using the less-restrictive PON process, the MSRC hopes to stimulate development of unique, creative ideas for transformative mobility improvement. The MSRC does have an expectation, however, that responses to this PON will convey sufficient detail so that a determination of a candidate concept's transformative potential, including likelihood for regional replication, can be evaluated. As such, the MSRC requests that respondents to this PON provide as much technical and programmatic information as is available to assist the MSRC in accurately evaluating a concept's benefit potential.

The period to submit a response under this PON closes on August 5, 2022, unless extended by the MSRC. Responses should be sent via e-mail to:

SECTION 4: PROJECT REVIEW & FUNDING PROCESS

All responses to this PON will be reviewed by the MSRC's Innovative Transportation Subcommittee. Concepts will be evaluated on their merits relative to the following criteria:

1. The perceived likelihood the proposed concept to result in a transformative mobility improvement with long term air pollution reduction benefits;

- 2. Project development status although concepts will be accepted that are still in a formative stage, the MSRC will differentiate between an "interesting idea" as compared to a transportation concept that has undergone more thorough research and development;
- 3. The formation status of project-enabling partnerships, i.e., whether all the pieces are in place or if necessary relationships are yet to be established;
- 4. Potential for project replication in the South Coast region innovative transportation projects that are perceived to have applicability to multiple jurisdictions will be deemed more favorable; and
- 5. Co-funding contribution level the extent to which an MSRC investment will be leveraged though contributions from other sources.

Additionally, the MSRC would like to understand how the demonstration of an innovative transportation strategy could potentially benefit disadvantaged communities (DAC) or areas that suffer disproportionately from air pollution. Responses to this PON should discuss if there is a possibility the project could be demonstrated within a designated DAC and/or how the mobility concept could benefit those most acutely impacted by air pollution as implementation progresses beyond the MSRC funding period.

Submittal of a response to this PON will result in one of the following three outcomes:

- A request by the MSRC for the submittal of a full proposal with detailed analysis of the project's immediate as well as long term regional impact for possible sole-source funding consideration;
- Notification that a detailed Request for Proposals (RFP) will be issued at a later date;
- Notification that the proposed concept has been declined from further consideration.

Innovative transportation projects selected for MSRC funding will be required to enter into a binding agreement with the South Coast AQMD on behalf of the MSRC. This agreement will be the result of a negotiation between the MSRC, South Coast AQMD, and the project lead entity. In all cases, projects must be approved by the MSRC and South Coast AQMD Governing Board prior to the execution of an agreement or disbursement of MSRC funds.
